

Forecast

Light snow, up to an inch forecasted to begin at 2 a.m. and ending at 9 a.m. 3-30-18.

6"-12" snow forecasted to begin falling at 10 p.m. 3-30-18 and end at 7 a.m. 3-31-18.

Strong NE winds, 25-35 mph forecasted throughout the day on 3-31-18.

Pre Plan

Report at 5 a.m. to begin plowing and treating roads on 3-30-18. Apply 300 lbs of salt on centerline.

Report at 5:a.m. to begin plowing and treating roads on 3-31-18. Apply 400-500 lbs of salt on centerline.

Comments

Roads cleaned up well on 3-30. All roads were black by noon on 3-30.

Lots of drifting and the snow started to compact later in the morning on 3-31.

Snow began at 4 a.m. and ended at 10 a.m. on 3-30-18.

Snow began at 11 p.m. 3/30 and ended at 9 a.m. on 3-31-18.

Crews started plowing between 5-6 a.m. on 3-30 as the snow continued to fall.

Crews started plowing at 5 a.m. on 3-31 as the snow continued to fall.

Conditions

Warmer conditions on 3-30 and roads melted to bare pavement quickly.

On 3-31 the snow fell at a very fast rate early in the morning.

Strong winds caused substantial blowing and drifting.

Struggled with compaction from traffic later in the morning.

Summary

Roads cleaned up well with the sun's heat.

Some compaction issues late in the morning on 3-31 but it cleaned up by early afternoon after a second pass.

Some drifting issues late 3-31-18. One truck spent 5 hours pushing back these drifts late on 3-31-18.

All roads were bare by 2 p.m. on 3-30 and by 3 p.m. on 3-31.

Decisions Made

Start at 5 a.m. each day before the snow was over.

Apply 300 lbs on 3/30 and 400-500 lbs on 3/31.

Lessons Learned

Salt worked well and kept up with falling and blowing snow on 3/31. The road temps are favorable late mornings and in the afternoons.
