

Inland Fresh Meadows <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Sedge Meadows Fresh (Wet) Meadow Wet to Wet-Mesic Prairies Calcareous Fens 	Lake sedge, hummock sedge, Canada bluejoint grass, blue vervain, woolgrass, joe-pye weed, reed-canary grass, prairie cord grass, green bulrush
Bogs <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Open Bogs Coniferous Bogs 	Sphagnum moss, wiregrass sedge, tussock cotton-grass, leatherleaf, Labrador tea, bog cranberry, pitcher plant, sun-dew, black spruce, tamarack
Shrub Swamps <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Shrub-Carrs Alder Thickets 	Willows, dogwoods, elderberry, buckthorn, jewelweed, alder, ferns, marsh marigold, winterberry
Wooded Swamps <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Hardwood Swamps Coniferous Swamps 	Black ash, red maple, aspen, ferns, marsh marigold, white cedar
Floodplain Forests	Maples, elm, willows, cottonwood, nettle, box elder
Seasonally Flooded Basins	Smartweed
